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Abstract

METHOD

Truth is the foundation that keeps relationships between individuals healthy and harmonious (Tarigan, Widiastuti, and Sihombing 2022).

Thirdly, Humility. Philippians 2:3-4 teaches, "Not seeking your own interests or vain praises. Rather, let each one humbly consider others better than himself." Humility is an attitude that puts God's will above all else and respects others sincerely. It is a value that stands in stark contrast to the egocentric nature often found in modern culture.

1. Theological Basis of Christian Values in the Bible

Christian values have a strong theological basis in the Bible. Love, for example, comes from God's primary commandment: 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart ... and your neighbour as yourself' (Matthew 22:37-39). Love of God and neighbour is at the heart of the law and the message of the prophets.

- 3. Fostering Strong Morality. Through character education, students are taught to understand and apply universal values, such as honesty, discipline, and empathy (Nuhamara 2018).
